

American Literature

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will provide Center for Leadership and International Relations students with a challenging study of American literature. A variety of required and supplementary literary works will be used as the foundation for literary, expository, and creative writing. Required research papers will introduce major types of criticism, and student presentations will hone public speaking skills. Students will learn in a cooperative environment in which they will be expected to assume increasingly active leadership roles, encouraging them to problem solve, take risks, and share their views with others.
